Pam has been a very active volunteer, six-time puppy raiser, and public speaker/advocate for PADS for many years. Becoming an Assistance Dog Instructor is a dream fulfilled for Pam, and is reflected in her informative, and energetic presentations. Pam's Demo Hearing Dog, "Bowen" is a veteran PADS Hearing Dog, and the ambassador of all that is wonderful about working dogs!! "Bowen", a Belgian Schipperke, will be celebrating his 10th birthday this year, and is showing no signs of slowing down! Come and see "Bowen's" winning smile and cheeky character at work, demonstrating the many talents of a PADS Hearing Dog.

*Saturday morning, at gosh awful dog show time, we were at show site at 6:30 am. Murphy's Law being what it is,

Sinner was first dog on at 8 am. We met up with Lea Murrav who was showing her Special, Ch. Maheekun's Majic Dancer (a 'Sly' son) and her new Junior Puppy female, 'Heart-Throb's Louisana Sparkle. Dancer took the breed, the puppy BO and Sinner, BOW. The Judge was Paul Stanton, from Tyreso, Sweden. Upstairs we headed for the Obedience Ring, Novice B, to finish Zena's 3^{rd} leg for her Can. CD. The judge was a very efficient and consistent lady, Marilyn Little from Mesa, Arizona and gave us an 1871/2. We spent the rest of the day, chatting with folks and watching the wonderful assortment of amazing dogs. The catalogue listed 832 dogs on the Saturdav and 814 on the Sundav.

*Sunday morning was a more civilized time, around 10 am. Under Sunday's judge, Elena Spector from Buenos Aires, Argentina, Sinner took BOB and BOW. Sparkle took BO. He was a happy boy! Group was at 1 pm (the same time Zena was scheduled in Obedience again – did I say Murphy's Law already) There were 18 breeds in the Group and we were delighted to receive a Group 4 ribbon. This gave him 4 points Sunday and 1 point on Saturday. We ran upstairs of this large enviable building and made it just in time to enter the Novice B ring with

Zena. Only 5 of the Novice B dogs showed up on Sunday and all 5 qualified under Judge Stephen Hazelwood from Winnipeg, Manitoba. Zena earned 1921/2, 3rd highest in class.

***We had a wonderful time at Calgary; we were able to see a brace Obedience entry, a Scent Hurdling competition trial, several Obedience transition classes as well as a substantial variety of breeds in Conformation. Thanks to Lea for her cheers and support of Sinner in the Group ring and for the kind comments from Koreen Nadon. Sinner and Zena were happy to head north with their 'winnings' and return to the Klondike.



But really it was more like an Intensive Care Unit, where the special cream and soap to keep my wound clean were kept, along with sterilized towels and gauze and stuff.

I didn't like it when my sore spot was cleaned, and I let them know it. This was very hard for Mum, partly because she's naturally queasy about medical things, and partly because she felt so bad about the hot water in the first place. But she was so brave! And even Paige got over her initial fright and she started to give me some special attention too.

"Super-Yummy-Food" (the kind that comes in tins) was brought to me and I was hand-fed, which was nice and I still demand this on occasion. Paige drew a picture of me in my special room, being served by Mummy, Paige, and Paige's imagi-

nary brothers and sisters.

During the week when the burnt skin fell off I was still sore and itchy. It was hard to sleep. In the end it all healed up, and although I am left with a bald patch on my back, I have enough hair around it to do a "comb-over" and it doesn't show. Stubborn fellow that I am. I still like to supervise in the kitchen ...

Rescue-news from Darcy Whelihan

Just a few words from Schipperke rescue in British Columbia. In March Diana Kinnear contacted me about a Schip in Prince Rupert that our American friends somehow found out about. This old girl "Molly" was 14 years old and needed our help to get her out of the SPCA and into a new home. Diana and I worked together and had her flown to Vancouver where I picked her up and took her home.

Molly was supposed to go to her new home in the States but do to circumstances, the new home did not work out. We had her close to a month before we found out things were not going to work out and after having her for that time period and because she fit very well into our "pack" and seemed to enjoy being a member of her very own pack we decided that she should spend the last of her days here with us. There were others that were willing to give her a home but we decided that she had been through enough and adjusting to another new home was something she just didn't have to go through again.

Molly is doing very well. She is a feisty old girl in her 15th year now. She still runs around the yard like a young pup and bugs Strider to play with her.

She does sleep more these days but when the weather is nice, she loves to be out in the yard with the other dogs. I have been contacted about a few other Schips needing homes (this circumstance was through Little Paws Rescue). I helped a woman place two older sisters into a new home. She also has a male (the father of these girls) that we were working on placing but because she would not surrender him to me, it is much harder to be successful placing him. Now she has not contacted me since before Christmas so I don't know what she did with him.


At agility class one night on of the instructors approached me about a Schip in the Mission Animal Control. The dog had been there for 4 months!! They were hoping the owners would change their mind and come back for the dog but they didn't. This Schip was older and intact but they had him neutered and wondered if I knew of anyone that would be interested in him. I told her I would work on it and contacted a few people. When I went to go get him a few days later, one of the people I had contacted from the Island had come and gotten him. Yes, another Schip placed and one less in a shelter.

The last Schip I know about was a sup-

posedly an aggressive one that the SPCA was going to place with a foster home that knew how to deal with aggressive dogs. When it didn't work out they were going to euthanize him but an agility friend had gone down to the shelter and said "you are not going to kill that dog, I will take him." They did allow my friend to adopt him. The "dog person" that was supposed to rehabilitate him called him "Bad Barney" when my friend called to find out what she had done with him. My friend said he is not bad, just not handled properly and is doing fabulously in his new home. He even has young children that adore him. I did try to get this dog Barney but they would not surrender him to me, or give me the time of day for that matter.

I look forward to 2007 having a list of people wanting to adopt a rescue being much larger than Schips needing to be adopted. In the past three years that I have been doing rescue in BC, there has only been one dog each year needing a home whereas last year the number jumped to six.
